³ Balston's pygmy perch (*Nannatherina Balstoni*) is known to have existed in the King River. It is believed that this species is now absent from this system. The loss of Balston's pygmy perch in the King River is not known, but could be due to the introduction of non-native species including eastern gambusia (*Gambusia holbrooki*) and or rainbow trout (*Oncorhynchus mykiss*) (Morgan et al. 2014).

⁴ Pouched lamprey (*Geotria australis*) is listed by the Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attractions as Priority 3, poorly known species.
